- Take a breath
- Observe
- Pull back: put in some perspective
- Practise what works




Each class have learnt about this and have also started practising one of the life skills to use.

Year 5 have been exploring The Decider life skill, 'IT **WILL PASS**'. When we are upset about a situation, we may feel the urge to escape or hide from it. This doesn't always help. We need to know that this emotion will pass. There are just some things that we cannot change or don't have control over, so we have to go along with it in the knowledge that *it will pass*.



Year 6 have practise the life skill, 'FACT OR OPINION'. When we are feeling the FIZZ,



our strong emotions power our opinions. The strong opinions then reinforce our emotions and this makes us fizz even more! It's a vicious cycle. It can lead us to act on impulse with unhelpful results. So, we need to ask ourselves is this FACT or OPINION? Facts have evidence, no argument, rational thoughts (head), would stand up in a court of law! Opinion is

based on our own beliefs, could change, is driven by our emotions (heart).

Fairtrade Fortnight




