



- Paired plurals: one person gives the singular and the other calls the plural (like a game of pass)
- Match plural nouns to their singular family (fox-foxes, book-books)



Year I - Summer Term I

- Questions are used to find things out
- Question marks are used to punctuate sentences which ask who, what, when, where, why or how
- Exclamations are used to show something is surprising or forceful
- Exclamation marks are used with sentences that start with what or how but don't ask a question
